

ORDER GRANTING IN PART, AND DENYING IN PART, VERIFIED JOINT MOTION TO DETERMINE CONFIDENTIALITY OF COURT RECORDS

THIS CAUSE came before the Court on February 14, 2011 upon the parties' Verified Joint Motion to Determine Confidentiality of Court Records dated October 4. 2010. Present were the Wife, and her counsel, Sean A. Costis, Esquire, of Zacur, Graham & Costis, P.A. Also present was the Husband, who appeared telephonically. and the Husband's counsel, John S. Thacker, Esquire of The Thacker Law Group, P.A. The Court, having considered the parties' Verified Joint Motion to Determine Confidentiality of Court Records, after having heard the testimony of the parties, and having reviewed the file as well as Florida Rule of Judicial Administration 2.420(c)(9), finds as follows:

- A. That confidentiality is required in order to avoid substantial injury to imnocent third party and that sealing specified portions of the Court file in the abovestyled cause avoids said substantial injury to an innocent third party, to wit, the parties' minor child.
- В. That the case in which this Order is being entered is a dissolution of marriage proceeding.
- C. That neither party has requested an Order making either of their names confidential.

- D. The degree, duration and manner of the confidentiality ordered herein is no broader than necessary to protect the interests of the innocent third party.
- E. 

FINAL JUDGMENT OF DISSOLUTION OF MARRIAGE

THIS CAUSE came on to be heard on the 25th day of April, 2011, upon the Wife's Petition for Dissolution of Marriage; and there being present before the Court the Wife, CHRISTINE ANNE WALES, and her attorney, Sean A. Costis, Esquire, of Zacur, Graham & Costis, P.A., the Husband, JIMMY D. WALES, and his attorney, John S. Thacker, Esquire; and there being proof and corroboration of residence; the Court finding that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter; the Court finding that the marriage of the parties is irretrievably broken and the Court finding that the parties have freely and voluntarily entered into a Marital Settlement Agreement on January 21, 2011, resolving all issues in the case, including issues of equitable distribution, spousal support, a parenting plan and time sharing schedule for the minor child, and attorney's fees, suit moneys and costs; and the Court being duly informed in the premises, it is thereupon

ORDERED AND ADJUDGED that the bonds of marriage entered into between the parties on March 24, 1997, are hereby dissolved. It is further

ORDERED AND ADJUDGED that the Marital Settlement Agreement entered into by the parties is hereby adopted and approved by this Court in all respects, and the terms of the Marital Settlement Agreement are incorporated by reference into this Judgment. The Agreement was signed by the Wife on January 17, 2011 and signed by the Husband on January 21, 2011. Both attorneys and the parties acknowledge possession of a true copy of the Marital Settlement Agreement, and the parties further agree that a copy of said agreement will not be filed with the Court at this time. Rather, the parties agree that the Marital Settlement Agreement shall only be filed in the event of a future enforcement-related action, modification action, or for any other purpose in which the Court has reserved jurisdiction herein. The Court adopts and approves the parenting plan which is a part of the Marital Settlement Agreement and finds that it is in the best interests of the minor child. The parties shall have shared parental responsibility for the minor child pursuant to the parenting plan. The parties are Ordered to comply with the terms of the Marital Settlement Agreement. It is further

ORDERED AND ADJUDGED that the parties shall abide by the Parenting Plan with regard to their minor child.

The United States is the country of habitual residence of the child(ren).

The State of Florida maintains the most significant contacts with the child(ren) and is the most appropriate forum for addressing parenting contact and time-sharing.

The State of Florida is the child(ren)'s home state for the purposes of the Uniform Child Custody Jurisdiction and Enforcement Act.

This Parenting Plan is a child custody determination for the purposes of the Uniform Child Custody Jurisdiction and Enforcement Act, the International Child Abduction Remedies Act, 42 U.S.C. ss 1 1601 et seq., the Parental Kidnapping Prevention Act, and the Convention on the Civil Aspects of International Child Abduction enacted at the Hague on October 25, 1980. It is further

ORDERED AND ADJUDGED that:

A. Commencing February 1, 2011 and on the first (1st) of every month thereafter until modified or terminated as hereinafter provided, The Husband shall pay to the Wife, for the support and maintenance of the minor child of the parties, the sum of one thousand three hundred dollars (\$1,300.00) per month, based upon the child support guidelines attached as Exhibit "A". Said payments shall be made to the Wife directly, except in the event the Husband is more than five (5) days late in paying said child

support, then the Wife shall, based upon her affidavit alone, be automatically entitled to the entry of an Income Deduction Order and Order Directing Payments through the Florida State Disbursement Unit. The Husband waives, both now and in the future, the right to a reduction in child support based upon substantial time sharing.

- B. <u>Cessation of Payments</u>. The Husband's obligation for child support shall cease upon the occurrence of the first of the following events:
 - (1) the death of the child;
- (2) attainment of the child's eighteenth (18) birthday, unless the child has not completed high school and reasonably expects to graduate before her nineteenth (19th) birthday, then the child support shall continue until the child graduates from high school. In no event, however, will the child support extend beyond the child's nineteenth (19th) birthday;
 - (3) the marriage or emancipation of the child:
- (4) entry of the child into the military service of the United States for a continuous period of time of one (1) year or more;
 - (5) the child becoming completely self-supporting.
 - (6) by Court Order.
- C. **Dependency Exemption**. The Husband shall be entitled to claim the minor child as a dependent, so long as he is current in all of his child support obligations for the preceding year and the exemption for the minor child has not been phased out under the appropriate provisions of the Internal Revenue Service Code. For income tax purposes, the Wife shall execute a release in writing in conformance with IRS Form 8332, as well as any other documents that may be required by the IRS to accomplish the provisions of this paragraph.

- Medical Insurance. The Husband shall pay for and maintain a medical D. insurance policy for the benefit of the minor child for as long as either party has a child support obligation for the minor child. The Husband shall pay all periodic premiums on the policy and shall provide the Wife annually with proof of payment of premiums and that said medical insurance coverage is in effect, at all times. The Husband shall deliver to the Wife duplicate copies of said policy and the Husband shall insure that the Wife has appropriate medical insurance cards for the minor child. All unreimbursed medical, hospital, dental, orthodontic (including, but not limited to, braces), ocular and psychological expenses for the minor child, not covered by insurance including the deductible shall be borne by the parties based upon their percentages of net income as set forth in the attached child support guidelines. Neither of the parties shall, with the exception of emergencies, be empowered to obligate the other to any unusual expenses for the minor child in this respect without prior consultation and agreement. It is further ordered that, should the child pursue a college education following her graduation from high school, the Husband shall continue to provide medical insurance for her so long as she is a full time student and eligible for such under insurance and IRS guidelines. The obligation for medical insurance while the child is in college shall not extend beyond the child's 24th birthday. The obligation for uncovered medical expenses shall terminate when the child support terminates as provided herein.
- E. Life Insurance to Secure Child Support. The Husband, shall, as an assurance for the payment of child support and for as long as he has an obligation to pay child support, maintain a life insurance policy with a benefit amount of five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000.00). The Husband shall name the Wife as the sole and irrevocable beneficiary of this death benefit. Such life insurance shall be kept in full force and effect until such time as the Husband's obligation to pay child support ceases.

The Wife shall, as an assurance for the support of the parties' child, maintain life insurance in the amount of Five Hundred Thousand Dollars and zero cents (\$500,000.00). The Wife shall name the Husband as the sole beneficiary of this death benefit WITH THE UNDERSTANDING THAT THE HUSBAND IS HOLDING ALL SUMS OF MONEY PAID AS A TRUSTEE FOR THE BENEFIT OF THE PARTIES' MINOR CHILD AND IT BEING FURTHER UNDERSTOOD THAT THE ENTIRE SUM PAID FROM THE LIFE INSURANCE POLICY SHALL BE USED FOR THE CHILD'S BENEFIT WHICH INCLUDES, BUT IS NOT LIMITED TO, THE CHILD'S COLLEGE TUITION, HOUSING AND BOOKS. Such life insurance shall be kept in full force and effect until such time as the Husband's obligation to pay child support ceases.

Each party shall pay his or her own periodic premiums for his or her life insurance required under the parties' Marital Settlement Agreement and shall annually furnish to the other party proof of the payment of premiums, until such time as their obligations under the Marital Settlement Agreement cease. Further, neither party shall pledge, borrow or hypothecate the life insurance policies in any way whatsoever, at any time.

Each party shall also notify the insurance carrier of the right of the other party to obtain any and all information with respect to all insurance, which is the subject matter of Article VI.E. of the parties' Marital Settlement Agreement, its enforceability, beneficiary and any changes with respect to said Article. Each party further authorizes the insurance companies, by execution of the parties' Marital Settlement Agreement, to communicate directly with the other party and to provide all information to the other party as set forth in said Article VI.E. of the parties' Marital Settlement Agreement.

All insurance premium payments made by either party pursuant to Article VI.E. shall not in any way whatsoever be construed as support to the other party and said insurance payments shall not be includable in the party's income or deductible by either party for federal income tax purposes.

ORDERED AND ADJUDGED that as and for equitable distribution, the Wife

shall keep the entire proceeds from the parties' prior sale of stock in 2008, totaling Three Hundred Forty-Seven Thousand Five Hundred Seventy and 14/100ths Dollars (\$347,570.14), which is already in the Wife's possession and control. This payment for equitable distribution shall not be deemed to be income to either party or deductible by any party for federal income tax purposes.

ORDERED AND ADJUDGED that the Husband shall pay to the Wife a non-modifiable, single one-time lump sum alimony payment in the amount of Seventy

Thousand and No/100ths Dollars (\$70,000.00) within ten (10) days of the execution of the Marital Settlement Agreement which shall not be taxable to the Wife nor deductible by the Husband for federal income tax purposes. It is further

ORDERED AND ADJUDGED that the Husband shall pay directly to the Wife as and for periodic alimony for her support the sum of six thousand two hundred dollars and zero cents (\$6,200.00) per month, commencing February 1, 2011 and continuing in the same sum on the first day of each month thereafter until August 31, 2019, unless terminated earlier as provided below. Said payments shall be made to the Wife directly, except in the event the Husband is more than five (5) days late in paying said alimony, then the Wife shall, based upon her affidavit alone, be automatically entitled to the entry of an Income Deduction Order and Order Directing Payments through the Florida State Disbursement Unit. The Wife has waived her right to convert the periodic alimony herein to any other form or type of alimony, or to extend the term of the Husband's alimony obligation, and her waivers thereof are forever non-modifiable for any purpose. The Husband forever waives his right to convert the periodic alimony obligation, and his waivers thereof are forever non-modifiable for any purpose. The

amount of alimony provided for herein is and shall be modifiable by either party as allowed by Florida law via Supplemental Petition. The Husband's obligation to pay alimony to the Wife shall forever terminate immediately and automatically upon the occurrence of any of the following events, whichever may first occur:

- 1. The Wife's remarriage; or
- 2. The death of either party; or
- 3. August 31, 2019 (i.e. the expiration of the term); or
- 4. The Wife receiving the "Contingent Termination Sum" as defined pursuant to Section XII(B) of the parties' Marital Settlement Agreement.

The provisions for termination of alimony are non-modifiable by either party.

The Wife waives her right to extend the term of the alimony beyond August 31, 2019 or to modify the termination provisions set forth in Article XII(A) of the parties' Marital Settlement Agreement and Article XII(B) of the parties' Marital Settlement Agreement.

The Husband waives his right to shorten the term of the alimony or to modify the termination provisions set forth in Article XII(A) of the parties' Marital Settlement Agreement and Article XII(B) of the parties' Marital Settlement Agreement and Article XII(B) of the parties' Marital Settlement Agreement and Settlement Agreement and Article XII(B) of the parties' Marital Settlement Agreement shall be income to the Wife and deductible by the Husband for federal income tax purposes.

Contingent Termination Sum. The Wife's need for spousal support is primarily based upon her present inability to convert the stock interests she receives pursuant to the Marital Settlement Agreement to cash or cash equivalent.

Accordingly, should the Wife receive cash, which cash includes money orders and cashiers checks, in the aggregate, to equal the "Contingent Termination Sum" as

defined in the parties' Marital Settlement Agreement, then the Husband's obligation to pay any form of alimony to the Wife shall automatically and forever terminate. The Contingent Termination Sum need not be paid at once, but may be paid in different amounts at different times. In the event the Wife ever receives cash of a combined sum sufficient to equal the Contingent Termination Sum, then the Husband's obligation to pay any form of alimony to the Wife shall automatically and forever terminate. Only those sums set forth in paragraphs (1), (2) and (3) below shall be considered in calculating the Contingent Termination Sum. Further, none of the transfers and/or conveyances as and for equitable distribution or lump sum alimony, nor the Husband's monthly periodic alimony payments of \$6,200.00, shall be considered in calculating the Contingent Termination Sum. Except as is otherwise required of him pursuant to the parties' Marital Settlement Agreement, it is the Husband's sole discretion on whether to contribute funds sufficient to meet the Contingent Termination Sum. It is agreed that the Contingent Termination Sum shall be two million three hundred thousand dollars (\$2,300,000.00). Only the following sums shall be considered in calculating whether the Wife has received enough aggregate cash equal the Contingent Termination Sum:

- Cash received by the Wife from the Husband toward purchase of any of her Wikia stock shares.
- Cash received by the Wife from a third party toward purchase of any portion of the Wikia stock shares she receives pursuant to the parties' Marital Settlement Agreement.
- 3. The Husband may also give the Wife additional cash above and beyond his other obligations pursuant to the parties' Marital Settlement Agreement as contribution toward the Contingent Termination Sum. Moneys provided to the Wife in

this manner shall also be considered in the contingent termination sum calculation. Any additional cash payments made by the Husband shall not be deemed as income to the Wife nor deductible by the Husband for federal income tax purposes.

The provisions of Paragraph XII.B. of the parties' Marital Settlement Agreement and the Contingent Termination Sum are forever non-modifiable for any purpose by either party,

Further, it is understood and agreed to by the parties that the \$70,000 lump sum alimony payment provided for in Article VIII of the parties' Marital Settlement Agreement, and the \$347,570.14 provided for in Article VIII of the parties' Marital Settlement Agreement, as well as the Husband's monthly periodic alimony payments of \$6,200.00, shall not be considered in calculating the Contingent Termination Sum. Further, none of the transfers and/or conveyances provided for in the parties' Marital Settlement Agreement as and for equitable distribution or lump sum alimony, nor the Husband's monthly periodic alimony payments of \$6,200.00, shall be considered in calculating the Contingent Termination Sum.

ORDERED AND ADJUDGED that this Court's prior Order Granting in Part, and Denying in Part, Verified Joint Motion to Determine Confidentiality of Court Records dated March 11, 2011 shall, pending further order of this Court, remain in full force and effect and beyond the date of this Final Judgment.

ORDERED AND ADJUDGED that the Court shall reserve jurisdiction of this cause for purposes of enforcing the executory provisions of this Judgment and the Marital Settlement Agreement, as well as to enter any further Orders that may become necessary from time to time to accomplish or otherwise enforce all of the provisions of this Judgment and the Marital Settlement Agreement. The Marital Settlement

Agreement shall not merge with the Final Judgment; rather, it shall survive the Final Judgment and remain binding upon the parties for all time.
